
We launched the World Cataract Project in 2017.

CATARACT?

Cataract is an eye disease defined as the loss of transparency and opacity of the natural lens of the eye located behind the pupil and stands out as the most important cause of preventable blindness worldwide.

According to World Health Organisation (WHO) data, there are 285 million people with visual impairment in the world, including 100 million cataract patients.

Cataracts account for 51% of the 39 million cases of blindness in the world.

The Alliance of International Doctors, which performed thousands examinations and cataract surgeries in different geographies for the last 5 years, plans permanent preventive health services in addition to cataract surgeries and provides health services through hospitals established in regions where there are problems in health services. It also aims to strengthen local capacity by carrying out capacity-building activities such as trainings for local health personnel

AID has made significant progress in reducing the burden of cataracts worldwide and improving the lives of millions of people, and has recently provided health services to 21 countries since 2017 with the cataract operations it started in Afghanistan.
