

TELEPHONE SERVICES

Public pay phones (card and coin) are automated phone cards may be bought from post offices or from international call offices. International calls can be dialed direct (code 000) or operator assisted (dial 0195/6). International dialing code is +254.

VISA AND HEALTH CERTIFICATION

A valid passport, not expiring for at least six months, is required and may be obtained in advance from the Kenya Embassy or High Commission in your country of origin, or upon arrival in Kenya. A yellow fever vaccination certificate is required ONLY if you are arriving in Kenya from an infected area.

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MAASAI MARA

The Maasai tribe (or Maasai) is a unique and popular tribe due to their long preserved culture. Despite education, civilization and western cultural influences, the Maasai people have clung to their traditional way of life, making them a symbol of Kenyan culture.

Maasai's distinctive culture, dress style and strategic territory along the game parks of Kenya and Tanzania have made them one of East Africa's most internationally famous tourist attractions.

The Maasai people reside in both Kenya and Tanzania, living along the border of the two countries. They are a smaller tribe, accounting for only about 0.7 percent of Kenya's population, with a similar number living in Tanzania. Maasai's speak Maa, a Nilotic ethnic language from their origin in the Nile region of North Africa.

The Samburu tribe is the closest to the Maasai in both language and cultural authenticity.

Through rituals and ceremonies, including circumcision, Maasai boys are guided and mentored by their fathers and other elders on how to become a warrior. Although they still live their carefree lives as boys - raiding cattle, chasing young girls, and game hunting - a Maasai boy must also learn all of the cultural practices, customary laws and responsibilities he'll require as an elder.

The wildlife, culture, conservation and education village centre offers volunteers the ultimate opportunity to explore, learn and interact with the Maasai community and their culture. The Mara conservation gives them a platform to serve, interact and also live like the Maasai people. Above all, the Conservancy is managed according to a model that protects the delicate eco-system and benefits the landowners who are the Maasai people.

The wild life, culture, conservation and education in Kenya is home to the big cats situated on the malarienda most point of the Greater Mara Ecosystem; borders the Olchorro Oliroua Conservancy to the south, and MMNC to the East. The important focus of the conservancy is livestock improvement through innovative cattle management programs, running alongside novel tourism projects.

The habitat comprises wooded acacia savannah with open plains on flat plateaus, riverine acacia forest and rocky, undulating hills which provide a varied habitat for browsing and grazing ungulates, as well as hideout thickets for the predators. The Mara River runs alongside the conservancy. There is a large number of giraffe and resident buffalo that live close to the Olerai boundary along the Mara River. Elephants frequent the conservancy and there is a pride of lion based on the edge of oloisukut. There are many hippos and crocodiles in the section of the river that borders the conservancy and the riverine forests which provide an area popular with leopards. Rare species such as Aardvark, Caracal, serval cat and Aardwolf are occasionally found. Colobus monkeys have been spotted in the valleys on the Kileleoni Hill and there have also been sightings of wild dog in Enonkishu. There is no doubt that Mara Osero offers an incredible game viewing experience.

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SOME BASIC INFORMATION

CULTURAL TIPS

PHOTOGRAPHY

It is considered courteous to ask people if you may take their picture before doing so, particularly in the more far-flung rural areas. A small (token) payment for the photography may be expected, rather more as a from of polite appreciation than anything else.

DO'S AND DON'TS

It is an offence to smoke in a public place; deface a Kenyan banknote; urinate in public; sunbath topless; hire a prostitute; buy or take drugs; remove wildlife products from Kenya, export products made from elephant, rhino or sea turtle derivatives, or to remove coral. Swearing and blasphemy are inadvisable. Visitors are required to stand when the Kenyan Anthem is played, or the National flag raised or lowered. They are also advised that photographing the president without prior permission or any military installation is not permitted. Bond or bail can be granted before a court or magistrate's discretion and all cases must be brought before a court.

YOUR LIFE IN KENYA

BANKING

Banks in major centre are open from 09.00 to 11.00. On the first and last Saturdays of each month. Banks in coastal towns open and close half an hour earlier. Travelers' cheques are accepted at most banks, bureau and hotels.

ATM

ATMS are available country wide with 24-hours access.(elephant, buffalo, rhinoceros, lion and leopard) to tiny antelopes such as the dik-dik, which is slightly larger than a rabbit. At least 32 (1,700m) modern and fast growing. Nairobi has endemic species are endangered. Kenya boasts around 1,137 species of birds. Spotting over 100 bird including species in a dry is not uncommon.

CREDIT CARDS

Most accept international VISA cards. Volunteers should preferably take their VISA cards owing to some issues with standard MASTER cards.



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TRAVELERS' CHEQUES

Travelers' cheques are accepted at most banks, bureaus and hotels.

TIPPING

Tipping is appreciated. Most hotels and restaurants include a 10% service charge.

TRANSPORTATION

Most Kenyans use 'matatus' as the primary method of transport. These are privately operated minivans following specific routes.

Taxis are plentiful outside the main hotels, shopping arcades, and central city points. There are a number of dial-up taxi companies in all major towns. A tariff sheet should be available, and it is wise to agree the price of the journey before you set off.

There are plenty of well-established and reputable car hire companies. To hire a car you must be over 23 and under 70 years and have had a driving license (International or commonwealth) for a minimum of two years.

Kenyan motorists drive on the left and overtake on the right-in general European-styled traffic regulations.

CELL PHONES

There is mobile phone coverage countrywide SIM cards and top up cards readily available.

INTERNET

Internet cafes operate in most areas.

SHOPPING AND BUSINESS HOURS

08.30 to 12.30 and 14.00 to 17.30 Monday – Saturday. Many businesses work Saturday mornings.

ELECTRICITY

220-240 volts AC.
